Goals:

- 1. To gain an understanding of the history of learning, educational psychology, and the major roles of a teacher as they are applied to the classroom setting, and to make meaningful application of the theories.
- 2. To demonstrate competency in the understanding of developmental theories such as language acquisition, social, moral, and cognitive development.
- 3. To develop conflict resolution strategies and application of behaviorist techniques in order to promote a more productive learning environment.
- 4. To gain practical knowledge in improving student learning through the use of various techniques such as distributive practice, equitable distribution, prompting, and Cooperative learning.

Course Content:

This course will present an overview of the process of learning. It will focus on providing students with skills needed to work with others in an educational setting. It will include coverage of theories of development, assessing and dealing with individual variability, devising objectives, learning theories, motivation, and measurement and evaluation of learning. One of the main emphases will be to gain a practical understanding of the various learning theories and the use of those theories in the classroom.

Course Requirements:

Exams: Students will be required to complete three(3) exams and a final exam.

Classroom Participation: Students will be required to participate in classroom activities (which may included quizzes) that will be assigned during classroom meetings or through required blackboard interactions/assignments

Assignments: Assignments will take various formats and include (but are not limited to): topic research, pre-chapter assessment, and written response to material presented during class.

Project: Students will be required to complete a final project that will examine the change in the classroom environment over time and the role educational theory development and research has played in that change.

Method of Evaluation:

Your course grade will be a composite based upon the three(3) exams and a final exam the assignments/class participation, and final project.
